The California Society of Printmakers invites members to submit work for a juried exhibition at Gallery Route One in response to the theme Searching For Meaning. This is the first of our Extraction series of exhibitions, members are welcome to participate in both opportunities.

#### Searching For Meaning

That is what artists do. We take the world around us: observations, events, experiences and we extract from that our existing worldview, or sometimes place upon it a new view. A view looking down from above, looking down over the edge. This past year we have all been searching for meaning in a pandemic, in political upheaval and social strife. There will come a time when we will no longer be in the present, when we will be looking at the past, at all that has happened, and the art created during this time. How will we see our shared experiences? How will we form a new view? This exhibit is an opportunity to take a step back, to stand on the edge and look over into the unknown. If we can create the meaning that we all search for, how will we exemplify that? What will it look like?

Dana Harris Seeger is a painter, printmaker and educator. She holds an MFA from San Jose State University and has taught at colleges and universities as well as private institutions all over the United States. My residency at Gruenwald Press in San Francisco was such a wonderful experience. Working with master printer John Gruenwald, I completed six stone lithographs, which were combined with monoprint, hand coloring and collage to make variable editions.



# **Meet your Board Members** Nikki Thompson **Residency Program Steward**

Hello, CSP folks!

A CSP member since 2019, I am new to the CSP board as the Residency Program steward.

My press, Deconstructed Artichoke Press (aka Nikki Thompson), uses zines and artist's books to explore such things as feminism, relationships, and politics through bookmaking, printmaking, poetry, and letterpress. The artist's book format is rich in multi-dimensionality; I can draw, letterpress, silk-screen, collage, sew, write, and more. The materiality-the sensuality of texture, color, weight, transparency—is important in my work. And finally, the four-dimensional progression of pages and structure creates excitement through pop-ups and engineering. Additionally, the details are as important as the whole in my artist's books.



How did I find my way to printmaking? I have a BA in Architecture from UC Berkeley and an MFA in Creative Writing from California College of the Arts. While I was at CCA, I did a lot of bookmaking and through bookmaking, I found my way to printmaking. Since I began on this journey, I have had the honor of receiving a College Book Arts Association Project Grant and Purchase Prize from 23 Sandy Gallery, among others, as well as being part of many library special collections, including University of Washington and Scripps College.

The themes of feminism and personal history often appear in my work. It might be subtle, like in A Tribute to Yasujirô Ozu. Ozu is my favorite movie director, and his work is usually about family and relationships -- feminist themes! Or it might be overt in its feminist themes and personal history, like Dodger Blues or To Vote As We Work.

I began my two-week residency by drawing from observation, directly on the litho stones. Drawing on these prepared stones is unlike drawing on any other surface—it is smooth and velvety, cold and solid. It had been years since I worked with lithography and John's expertise in stone lithography made it possible for me to embrace the process with confidence that what I was drawing would be accurately translated to the printing paper.

My subjects were cuttings from my backyard garden, and my intent for the residency was to work within themes of landscape, place, color as poetry for internal and external spaces, and the tension between represented space and real space. Having the time and space to sit and draw was one of the gifts of this residency. Another gift was the responsiveness and flexibility of printing with John. His guidance and command of stone lithography allowed us to follow the unknown of daily studio practice—problem solving within process, improvisation, and response to each day's work that can change the direction and output of the project. I will always be grateful to have had the opportunity to work at Gruenwald Press.


